Dear Parent,

Hurst College offers a range of awards for various aspects of school life. Award holders are valued at Hurst, not only for what they themselves can achieve, but also as role models for others and for their ability to support and lead others. They are certainly not seen as a breed apart, but are full members of our community who have a distinct role to play.

During their time at the college, they will be well supported and every step will be taken to ensure that they make the most of the opportunities here and of their own abilities. In this respect they are like every other pupil, but there is a recognition they have something particular to offer the rest of the school. Being an award holder is not only an honour and a privilege, but also a very real responsibility.

Awards come with expectations and it is important that these are recognised by those who hold them. There is a regular process of reviews which should, ideally, be congratulatory but also exploratory in order to see how best to develop an individual pupil's talents. However, they are also designed to ensure that award holders do, indeed, play their part and make the most of their abilities and talents. In this way, award holders can expect a tremendous amount from the school, but also the school will expect much from them as well. Above all, award holders are expected to set a good example and, in the unlikely event that they transgress any of the Big 12 (see Pupils' Guide) they will lose their award. It is my experience that our approach to awards and award holders is very constructive and beneficial to both individuals and the school as a whole.

SCHOLARSHIP CONDITIONS

- Music award holders are required to sing in the Chapel Choir, and also to take part in instrumental ensembles such as Orchestra, Wind Band, Jazz Band, as appropriate.
- Sixth Form awards are made subject to the candidates achieving Level 7 or above in the subjects they intend to study in the Sixth Form at Hurst. Where a pupil wishes to start a new subject which they have not studied before, they need to have achieved a Level 7 in a GCSE subject closely related to it (i.e. for Economics, ideally a pupil should have a Level 7 in Maths GCSE). Students should also have a minimum of Level 5 GCSE in Maths and English.
- Award holders will be monitored throughout their time at the College and awards will be reviewed annually to ensure satisfactory contribution and progress. The annual review of award holders by the Headmaster and others will take place in the Lent Term. If the award holder is not making satisfactory progress, parents will be advised and the pupil set clear targets. If these are not met by the end of the Summer Term, the award will be withdrawn at that point.
- Award holders are also expected to be role models at all times and to represent the College, at the College's request, at Open Mornings, matches and performances (as appropriate to the Award) and at similar occasions.
- Any pupil in possession of an award of any sort who is suspended from the School will automatically lose their award.



The number and size of academic awards is at the discretion of the Head of College with the larger awards granted for exceptional performance.

ASSESSMENT PROCESS

Candidates will take two examinations in their nominated subjects from the Sixth Form syllabus.

In addition, candidates will sit verbal and non verbal reasoning tests and will have interviews with the Head of College and other members of the Senior Management team.

EXPECTATIONS OF ACADEMIC SCHOLARS

Academic scholars are expected to set an example to other pupils in their conduct and approach to all aspects of academic life and have a strong work ethic.

Academic scholars are expected to actively engage in the weekly Senior Johnians sessions as well as be available to help and promote the Hurst schools in academic departments at Open Mornings. In addition, Academic scholars will enter the annual Hurst Essay Competition and attend any additional trips, lectures and enrichment activities as directed by the Director of Academic Development and other staff. Academic scholars are expected to enter various Olympiads, Challenges and external essay competitions as directed by the Director of Academic Development.

All Academic Scholars are required to attend an annual review meeting with the Head of Year and the Head of College.

The number and size of art awards is at the discretion of the Head of College with the larger awards granted for exceptional performance.

ASSESSMENT PROCESS

Candidates are assessed during an Assessment Day and based on their portfolio of work which they should bring with them on the day.

Candidates will have an interview with the Director of Art and Photography. They will be expected to demonstrate enthusiasm and commitment to Art and show they have generated a broad range of quality ideas through a variety of processes and styles.

In addition, candidates will have an observational drawing exercise to help assess their individual approach and aptitude. Candidates may bring with them any particular equipment they wish to use e.g. paper, paint brushes etc. although all materials can be supplied.

Candidates will sit verbal and non verbal reasoning tests and will have interviews with the Head of College and other senior members of the Senior Management team.

PORTFOLIO

Candidates' portfolio of artwork should include earlier studies (it is important to note development), as well as their most recent body of work. It is expected that this would include evidence of research and initial ideas, through to more complete outcomes.

We are looking for a portfolio with a broad approach, a sense of flair, process and development, and an awareness and understanding of how to use a variety of media. Candidates should be prepared to discuss their portfolio during the Art interview and should bring photographs of any 3D work and work larger than A1 size.

EXPECTATIONS OF ART SCHOLARS

Art Scholars are expected to participate fully with Art Department activities such as regular scholar meetings, availability for open mornings and other school events as directed by the Director of Art and Photography.

All scholars will be required to attend an annual scholarship review meeting with the Head of College and the Director of Art and Photography.

DANCE SCHOLARSHIPS (AWARDS UP TO £1,275 PER TERM)

The number and size of dance awards is at the discretion of the Head of College with the larger awards granted for exceptional performance.

Students must show a passion for dance and a dedication and commitment to the subject as a performer, creator and spectator. This award will be offered to a candidate who demonstrates a high level of technical competence and who is able to access a range of dance styles. Examinations in ballet and modern dance following the RAD and ISTD syllabuses, while beneficial, are not essential.

Candidates will sit verbal and non verbal reasoning tests and will have interviews with the Head of College and other senior members of the Senior Management team.

ASSESSMENT PROCESS

Candidates will be required to:

- A. Participate in a release-based contemporary dance class of approximately 45 minutes.
- B. Perform a work between 1-2 minutes in length that the candidate themselves has choreographed based upon one of the following stimuli: A 2D or 3D artwork; a textual stimulus such as a poem or prose; an event in history.
 - Candidates should ensure that they are able to discuss their choreographic process and the themes explored within the work.
- C. Attend a short interview with the Head of Dance and present a written 200 word programme note to accompany the choreography.

In the interview the candidate should be able to discuss:

• Their own performance experience with some evidence of self evaluation

In the programme, the candidate will need to outline:

- Their intention for the dance
- Their reason for the choice of music
- Key movement material to look out for

EXPECTATIONS OF DANCE SCHOLARS

Dance Scholars are expected to participate fully in dance at Hurst, becoming a member of one of the in-house dance companies, attending dance events, open mornings, theatre trips and workshops.

All scholars will be required to attend an annual scholarship review meeting with the Head of College and the Head of Dance.

DOWNS (SPORTS) SCHOLARSHIPS (AWARDS UP TO £1,275 PER TERM)

The number and size of sports awards is at the discretion of the Head of College with the larger awards granted for exceptional performance.

Candidates are assessed on merit and should be, as a minimum, of county standard in their preferred sport, or have the potential to become country standard during their time at the College. Although all sports are considered, candidates majoring in the following will receive priority:

Boys

Rugby, Hockey, Cricket

Girls

Hockey, Netball, Cricket

Candidates are required to submit references from coaches and clubs outside of school to support their application. Top performers in one of the major sports at Hurst is desirable and will take priority. A highly gifted performer in a minor sport e.g. tennis, swimming, athletics would be considered, however, they would need to be at A team standard in at least one of the major sports listed above.

ASSESSMENT PROCESS

Candidates will undergo sport specific practises/conditioned games - where core skills for individual sports are highlighted.

Candidates will undergo fitness testing - a series of aptitude tests designed to elicit levels of success in the following components: speed, agility, power, cardio-vascular and endurance.

Candidates will be watched performing in the following sports:

Boys Rugby, Hockey, Cricket, Swimming and Tennis

Girls

Hockey, Netball, Cricket, Swimming and Tennis

Other sports may be added based on candidate's expertise, however, it is important to note that the major sports receive priority.

Candidates will sit verbal and non verbal reasoning tests and will have interviews with the Head of College and other members of the Senior Management team.

EXPECTATIONS OF SPORTS SCHOLARS

Sports scholars are expected to make an active and high quality contribution to the sporting life of the College in all three terms, both in the development of their talents and their attitude as leading sportsmen and women. Sports scholars are expected to represent the College in all school fixtures for which they have been selected.

All scholars will be required to attend an annual scholarship review meeting with the Head of College and the Director of Sport or Assistant Director of Sport.

The number and size of drama awards is at the discretion of the Head of College with the larger awards granted for exceptional performance.

Awards will be given to candidates who have an enthusiasm for and a commitment to the subject, and who has demonstrated a sustained commitment to Drama for at least two years, such as by studying Drama at GCSE, participating in performances of plays at their school or in extra-curricular drama activities, taking LAMDA or other awards in acting, or evidence of participating in productions outside school.

It is not essential that candidates have studied Drama at GCSE, but a high predicted grade would be expected if they have.

Any participation in an examination programme, such as LAMDA, New Era or Trinity Guidhall, would also be regarded as evidence of commitment to drama, as will evidence of experience of live theatre as an audience member.

ASSESSMENT PROCESS

Candidates will be required to audition before the Director of Drama. They should prepare two pieces:

- A speech from a play written between 1560 and 1720
- A speech by a modern playwright written after 1900.

These should be memorised and delivered with a full awareness of the importance of vocal technique as well as a physical response (facial expression, movement, gesture, posture). Candidates are asked to bring copies of their audition texts with them. Candidates will also be given a visual stimulus from which they will have 5 minutes to prepare a short piece of original theatre.

Candidates will have an interview with the Director of Drama where they will be expected to discuss a visit to a piece of live theatre, whether dance, drama or opera, and should also be able to discuss their own performances on stage with some evidence of an analytical approach to drama.

Candidates will sit verbal and non verbal reasoning tests and will have interviews with the Head of College and other members of the Senior Management team.

EXPECTATIONS OF DRAMA SCHOLARS

Drama scholars will be expected to be involved in at least one production a term with one of these being in a performing capacity and the other two as part of front of house or in the backstage team. It is expected that scholars will attend other theatrical performances throughout the year and over their time at the College will be required to write a review for the school website and magazine. Attendance at scholar-specific sessions is compulsory as is attending all Open Morning events.

Drama award holders will be expected to audition for roles in college productions. Sixth Form Drama Scholars are encouraged to direct, or assist in directing, a small-scale production in the Drama Studio.

Drama scholars must demonstrate a dedicated attitude to all rehearsals and ensure that this is a priority in their busy schedules.

The number and size of music awards is at the discretion of the Head of College with the larger awards granted for exceptional performance.

Candidates will be assessed on potential as well as achievement, but as a guideline they should be of Grade 6–8 standard on at least one instrument. A second instrument (including voice) would be an advantage but not essential. An accompanist is available and there is no need to supply a copy of the music prior to the assessment day.

It is not essential that candidates have studied Music at GCSE but a high predicted grade would be expected if they have.

Preliminary and informal auditions are encouraged and may be held at any time by arrangement with the Director of Music.

ASSESSMENT PROCESS

Candidates will be required to perform two contrasting pieces on their chosen instrument (including voice). An accompanist can be provided. If a second instrument is offered, candidates will be asked to play a prepared piece.

Candidates will be asked to sight-read on their first instrument and will be asked to respond to aural tests.

Candidates may offer a solo song if they wish.

Candidates will have an interview with the Director of Music which will involve questions on the candidates' knowledge of, and interest in, music.

Although these requirements are specific, candidates will have an opportunity to demonstrate whatever musical skills they have (e.g. third instrument, composition, improvisation). Candidates will sit verbal and non verbal reasoning tests and will have interviews with the Head of College and other members of the Senior Management team.

EXPECTATIONS OF MUSIC SCHOLARS

A Music scholar will be a talented musician who is keen to be involved in ensemble music-making. Their enthusiasm for music will be infectious and their presence in rehearsals will be energising for all. Music scholars involvement in the musical life of the College should be substantial.
