While expectations are high in all aspects of College life, pupils strive only towards achieving their own personal bests. Through the Challenge Grade and tutorial system, high aspirations are realised for every pupil at GCSE and A-level. Academic success is not measured against league tables, but rather through Value Added for every individual. At Hurst, excellence is defined by the progress and success of *all* pupils.

Alongside their studies, an inclusive super curriculum enables pupils to participate in a wide range of activities; from CREST award and Geography field trips to Maths Olympiads and French Debating, pupils develop leadership and life skills at all levels.

The Higher Education and Highly Selective University programmes guide pupils in making the best decision for themselves, with the majority heading to Russell Group universities.

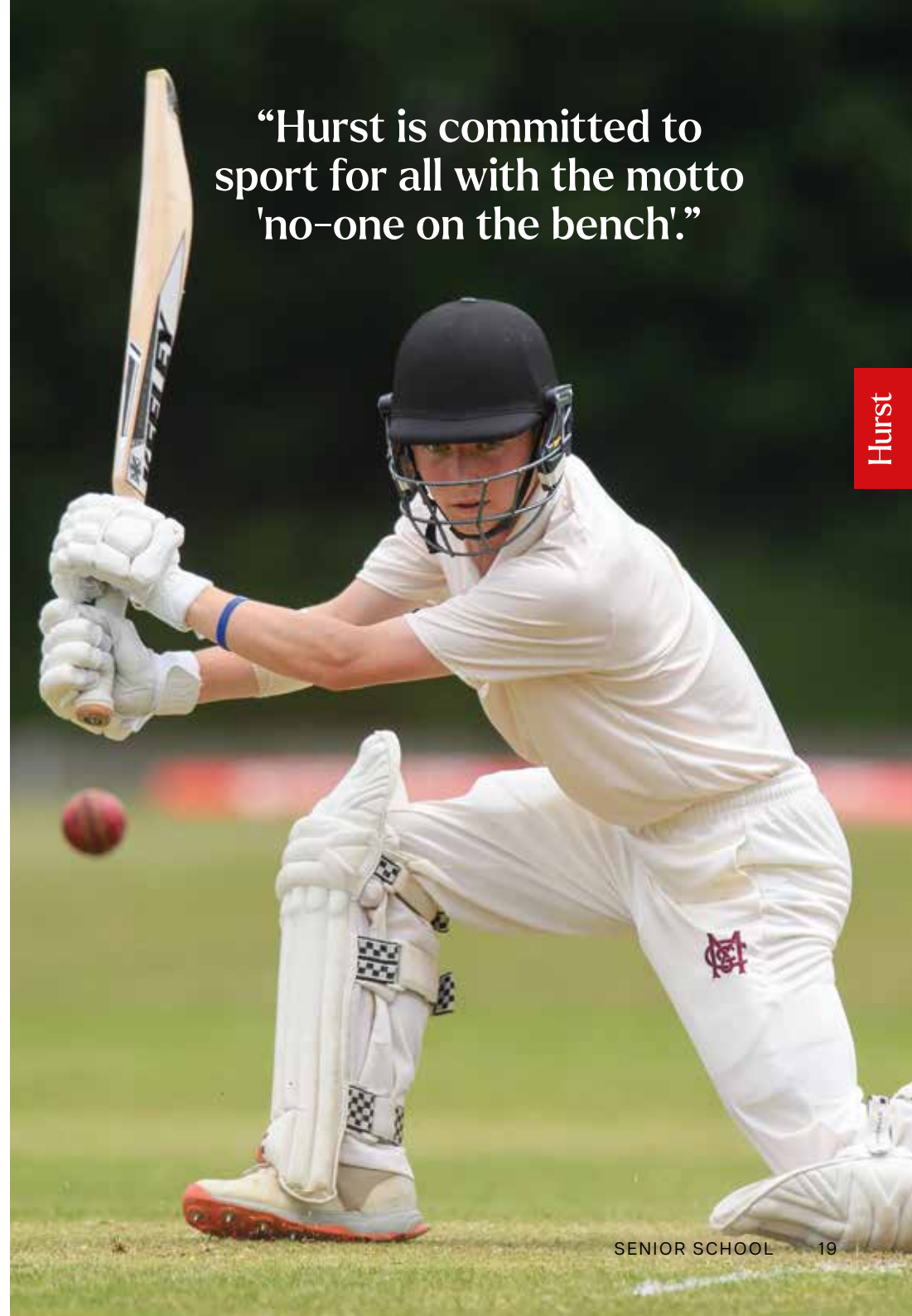

Community and Pastoral Support

Hurst provides a safe and homely setting where everyone is welcomed, respected, and valued for who they are. Caring and committed staff champion the physical health, mental wellbeing, and overall happiness of all pupils, and additional support is always available to those who need it.

Hurst has a genuine family feel. Pupils can choose day, flexi or weekly boarding when they arrive and are allocated to one of twelve Houses, where they look after each other within an environment that fosters healthy competition and collaboration. Pupils develop a strong sense of House loyalty, and the dedication of House staff ensures that they receive excellent academic and pastoral care within this 'home away from home'.

In Upper Sixth, students join a co-educational day and boarding house. Set in its own grounds, St John's provides students with an excellent transition into university and life beyond Hurst.

Caring and committed staff champion and nurture the physical health, mental wellbeing and happiness of all pupils at the College. Thanks to our integrated pastoral programme – including an

on site Wellbeing Centre, Chaplaincy, School Counsellors and Welfare Group – support is always available to pupils should they need it.

As School Wellbeing Champions and House Prefects, pupils mentor and take care of their peers within their Houses and beyond. Across the College, the work of our pupil and staff Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) Group is instrumental to promoting Hurst's inclusive, positive culture.

Through charity fundraising, environmental conservation, and the Hurst Educational Trust (HET), pupils develop a sense of personal responsibility and understand how to enrich the lives of others.
